## Coming Soon! Urban Agriculture Courses

Urban agriculture is increasingly recognized for its potential contribution to urban poverty alleviation, urban food security, productive reuse of urban wastes, urban greening, local economic development, and community development, among others. In response to an increasing demand for training in urban agriculture, Ryerson University's G. course - 'Dimensions of Urban Agriculture' (CVFN 411) - will be offered from September 2008 onwards.

## Understanding Urban Agriculture (CVFN 410)

Duration: 42 hours Fee: \$456 (CDN) Schedule: May 10-August 9, 2008

Millions globally practise urban agriculture, with governments and civil society organizations increasingly promoting it to enhance urban food security, health, community building, sustainable livelihoods, and environmental management. This course expands the understanding of urban agriculture, its main types and dimensions, its potential impacts, the constraints and opportunities facing it, the stakeholders involved in it, the historical contexts shaping it, and the local, regional, and international development trends bearing on it.

# Dimensions of Urban Agriculture (CVFN 411)

Duration: 42 hours Fee: \$456 (CDN) Schedule: September-December, 2008

This course describes the dimensions (functions, roles, benefits, potential risks) of urban agriculture and how these complement, supplement, compete with, substitute for, or undermine those provided by other land uses, sectoral activities and actors. The main dimensions covered are: health and food security, socio-cultural dimensions, economic dimensions, and environmental dimensions. Selected well-documented case studies will be used throughout the course to highlight each dimension separately, before bringing them all together.
